

Why Ceiling Hoists?

To manage manual handling risks (for carers and clients)

To improve ease of handling for carers



Types of Hoists

All hoists installed to date are fixed

All are standard (spreader bar) yoke design

One portable hoist and gantry in equipment loan pool



Brand Choice

A variety of hoist brands have been installed over time.

Purchase and installation coordinated by Property Department (influenced by ability of supplier to install, weight test and provide building certification and after sales support)



Track Configurations



Various track configurations

 straight tracks (eg. In bathrooms, in consultation rooms)



Track Configurations

- X-Y

 (configuration of choice for total room coverage)
- curved (bedroom to bathroom in accommodation facilities)





Facilities

Ceiling hoists are installed in many CPL facilities

- All Support in the Community facilities in Brisbane Metropolitan area
- Residential facilities (Hillcrest, Fig Tree Pocket)
- Some allied health consulting areas
- Mylestones Mobility (Geebung)/training facility
- Mylestones Solutions (supported employment)

Benefits

- Ceiling hoist is always available vs. Need to locate mobile floor hoist
- Space saving
- Great for transferring clients to floor/plinth for assessment

Limitations

Location within building and within room



Training

Carers undergo training in the use of ceiling hoists as part of our Safe Handling of People Training

Training is practical with the opportunity to experience being moved in a ceiling hoist

Allied Health staff provide training regarding client specific handling techniques



Obstacles and Issues Cost

Issues with retrofitting due to building suitability

Fraying of straps in some locations

Servicing/Maintenance (including difficulties obtaining replacement parts for some hoist brands)



Lessons Learned

All new sites are fitted out with ceiling hoist tracks installed or capability for ceiling hoist installation ensured

Periodic servicing contract (budgeted)
